Grace Higgins studies at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama where she is now in her second year studying the flute with Sarah Newbold. Prior to this, she studied at Malvern St James School where she held a Music Scholarship for seven years. Whilst in Cardiff, Grace enjoys playing regularly with the Raglan Wind Quintet, as well as playing Principal Flute with the Bute Philharmonia.

Grace was a member of the National Youth Wind Orchestra for two years during which time she went on tour to Switzerland. She has also toured Germany with the Worcestershire Youth Orchestra, which included a performance at the Bach Festival.



More recently, she has enjoyed performing with the Marylebone Symphonic Wind Orchestra in their inaugural concert and with the Dorian Chamber Orchestra, both in London.

Grace has attended numerous flute courses and masterclasses, and she was awarded a Diploma with Distinction in 2016. She hopes to continue her studies in classical musical performance to Masters level before embarking on a career as a professional flautist.



Tim Sidford is a freelance pianist and music teacher. He has appeared extensively throughout the UK as well as in concerts in Germany and Holland. In London he has performed at the Wigmore Hall, Purcell Room, St Martin-in-the-Fields, St James' Piccadilly, and Leighton House. Tim has worked with countless musicians and is much in demand as an accompanist and chamber musician. His long standing duo partnership with saxophonist John Barker has been supported by the Countess of Munster Award and the Kirckman Concert Society. He is also a member of the Estrilda Piano Trio and the Boehm Clarinet Duo.

After reaching the BBC Young Musicians Semi-Finals aged 15, Tim was awarded an Associated Board scholarship to study at the Royal College of Music, where he took his degree and Postgraduate Diploma (gaining Distinction). During his time there he won four of the College's prizes for Piano and Chamber Music, and was chosen to perform for HM The Queen. Tim has a passion for music education, and currently teaches in three schools including Malvern St James. He has given numerous educational and outreach performances, encompassing a wide range of musical styles, and delights in taking music into the wider community. Carol currently conducts The Hills Singers and Worcester Young Voices, comprising two choirs of 5-16 year olds. She also works as an examiner for the ABRSM. Carol sings in the international touring choir Sine Nomine and locally in the vocal octet Serenata.
